Department Overview:

The University Center, centrally located on campus, has you covered in many ways! From comfortable lounges, study areas, and game rooms to convenient services. The University Center houses many of the campus' student services such as, the Department of Student Life, Student Government Association, M.O.S.A.I.C, Copy Center, and much more!

University Center and Event Services department provides professional support and services to UCCS students, faculty, staff, and the greater community through event coordination, facility usage, and personal development. As stewards of the University Center, we strive to provide a safe, welcoming, and engaging environment through programming, educational opportunities, services, and facilities.

UC Programming Overview:

UC programming is a multi-faceted events series that is dedicated towards providing students with opportunities to be entertained, make authentic connections, provide an alternative to toxic activities, and explore their interests/passions in a safe environment. By using student feedback to empower student involvement, UC Programming will collaborate, sponsor, and execute various opportunities for students to enhance their overall experience at UCCS.

Why is UC Programming necessary? Such programming is often viewed as a way to help students avoid negative social situations and/or behaviors that can lead to such tragic outcomes as "fatal car accident[s], date rape or death from alcohol poisoning" (Waltrip, p. 36). According to US Department of Health and Human Services figures, "it is estimated that, of the 10.4 million 12-20-year old's who drink alcohol, 29.4% are classified as binge drinkers, and 6.0% are classified as heavy drinkers" (Latta, p. 39). Additionally, "Wechsler and Kuo [2000] reported that in 1999 approximately two of five students enrolled in four-year colleges and universities were 'binge' or 'high risk' drinkers" (Latta, p. 39). With these considerations in mind, it may be incumbent upon student programming organizations to consider activities that are intrinsically alcohol-free or that distract students from drinking and the

harmful and/or illegal behaviors that may result. This is where late-night programming can be extremely helpful. Assessment of existing late-night programs has shown that when such programming is available to students, negative alcohol-related behaviors decrease.

Program Goals:

- 1. Provide students with alternate to alcohol related activities through alcohol-free programing.
- 2. Offer a variety of quality programs that will meet the interests of a diverse student body.
- 3. Provide pathways for authentic connection and inclusive community, encouraging student involvement in leadership, planning, and co-sponsoring programs.
- 4. Highlight the offerings at the University Center for student's casual use: "living room of campus"

Learning Outcomes:

- As a result of attending UC programming activities, students will enhance their feeling of engagement, belonging, and loyalty.
- As a result of attending UC programming activities, students will be exposed to programs/events that are not possible to attend in the local community.
- As a result of attending UC programming activities, students will have the ability to meet and interact with individuals that have similar and differing opinions and beliefs on a variety of subjects.
- As a result of attending UC programming activities, students will be exposed to programs/events that illustrate opinions and beliefs differing from their own.

UCES Employment Program Overview:

Student Contact: Shadow/Train Student staff in desk coverage, administrative duties. Attend relevant student clubs/orgs/groups meeting and or events, in support of robust student programming and related administrative support. Support student employment program: meet individually with student employees to address academic, career, and personal goals. Assist in student employment evaluation and assessment functions.

Desired Qualifications:

Must be enrolled in UCCS SAHE Graduate Program.

Must have a 3.0 or higher GPA

Must possess the ability to work independently and in groups to complete projects.

Previous event management experience a plus.
